Hello to everyone in the region. This year has been a difficult one for growing our favorite flower. Not enough rain, then too much rain and then, of course rust. The early season looked promising for a good bloom season with steady weekly rains in late winter and early spring. Then the rain stopped. No rain for many weeks, and then flooding rains. Seems we are never satisfied. When midsummer did come so did the rust, as the conditions were perfect for the rust to start. Rust loves high temperatures and humidity and we have had both.

In our garden, we have been keeping the rust in check with Daconil in spray rotation with other fungicides. Our rust problem was not widespread over the garden and only scattered in different areas. We trimmed back the foliage and sprayed every five to seven days. I have not seen signs of rust lately. I hope any of you who have rust are keeping it in check. Please, let's get on top of this new menace so that we can enjoy our gardens to the fullest.




> have met Mr. Duplantis. He and his wife Myrtis are very active in several clubs in our region and he will do an outstanding job.

Director's Desk

Beth Crochet, Louisiana Director, AHS Region 13 AHS Chairman of Regional Officers

The fall meeting of the AHS Board of Directors was held in Dallas, Texas on October 27-28, 2001. The Daylily Growers of Dallas was the host club for the meeting and they welcomed the Board Members with a Southwest dinner on Friday night at a restaurant and a barbecue dinner on Saturday night at the home of Kay Day, AHS President.

On Saturday the Board met from 8:00 A.M. until 5:00 P.M. with a break for lunch, also provided by the host club. The Board made a number of important decisions during the meeting.

Of interest to Exhibition Judges and to Garden Judges is the fact that the JUDGING DAYLILIES revised HANDBOOK should be printed and available for sale by early 2002. Since a number of changes have been made ALL JUDGES will need to purchase the new edition as soon as it becomes available.

The Board of Directors voted to require a test for Garden Judges Workshop I and to charge a fee of \$5.00 for the workshop as well as the \$5.00 fee for Workshop II. These fees are to offset the cost of printing the materials for the workshop and the test. Because a test is administered and must be passed with

a minimum score of 70 points, it will no longer be possible for a person to take both Workshop I and Workshop II at the same time.

- Workshop I can be taken at any time of the year and is not held in a garden, but in a place where a set of slides can be used to aid in the instruction. Following the instruction, the test will be given.
- Workshop II must be given in a garden setting during bloom season.

The results of the Popularity Poll were presented and the results for region 13 were disappointing. In 2000, 45% of the Region 13 members voted the Popularity Poll and we tied for 1st place in the percentage of our members who voted. In 2001 we dropped to 3rd place with only 26.5% of our members voting. Let's try to improve our voting record in 2002.

A change was approved in the Popularity Poll ballot for 2002 and now the number of cultivars to list on the ballot will be up to 10 instead of a possible 25.

The Scientific Studies Committee announced that the fund-raising letters sent to Club Presidents, RVPs, RPDs, and Regional Editors have been successful and over \$10,000.00 has been donated to the Joe E. House Scientific Fund for the study of the rust question.

AHS The matched the contribution with a donation of \$10,000.00 g as promised. These funds will: be used to continue the study of the rust problem.



- Another study has been approved which was submitted by the University of Nebraska. This one will deal with the chemical effectiveness in combating daylily rust.
- The study by Dr. Jean Williams-Woodard at the University of Georgia is ongoing and much information about her findings can be found on the Internet, in the various newsletters and in the DAYLILY JOURNAL.

The meeting Sunday morning was informal and was a general discussion of the rust problem and the fungicides being used by various growers to keep the rust in check.

The AHS Board of Directors thanks all clubs and individuals in Region 13 who have contributed to the Joe E. House Scientific Fund for the study of the rust problem. Please remember that research projects are expensive and funds will continue to be needed before a solution is found.

The arrangement was entered in the Design Division titled "Season's Performance." Within this division, three classes were eligible for AHS Tricolor Awards. Nancy's was entered under the Exhibit of Upward Brilliance class. Nancy's design featured the following daylilies: TIGER'S EYE, IT'S OURS, and RENEGADE LADY. Other plant materials included Lantana, Abelia, Canna leaf, and Yucca blades.

Rust Information Update

The following is from the AHS grant researcher working on daylily rust:

Rust Update: 9-24-2001

From: Dr. Jean L. Williams-Woodard (Holder of the AHS Grant for study of

Daylily rust)

Hello everyone,

I said that I would try to keep you updated on what we are finding in our research on rust. Well, I just found out from fungicide trials conducted by my research counterpart at University of Georgia/A, Dr. James Buck, that in his trials the fungicides Heritage (azoxystrobin) at either 2-oz. and 4-oz/100 gallon, Daconii (chorothalonii) and Fore (mancozeb) worked the best at controlling rust infections.

Surprisingly, myclobutanil (Systhane, Immunox) and flutolanil (Contrast) were not very effective at reducing rust infections. Plants were inoculated with a rust spore suspension and rated 7-16 days after inoculating. New rust pustules developed on Systhane and Contrast treated plants within 7 days

after inoculating. The only reason I am indicating this is that what was currently being recommended for rust control is Systhane (or Banner Maxx, which worked little better than the Systhane in our trials), Contrast, Daconil and Heritage rotations.

From our trials, the best fungicides to use would be Daconil, Heritage, and Fore (mancozeb). If using Heritage include a non-ionic surfactant (we were using Triton-X-100) because it works much better in reducing rust infections.

The one problem with the Daconil/Fore/ Heritage rotation is that Daconil and Fore are contact fungicides that should be applied on a 7 to 10-day interval. Spraying every 2 weeks with either of these products may not be effective in controlling rust. The residual of Heritage is longer, but another contact fungicide should be applied at the most 2 weeks after the Heritage application.

Our fungicide trials were conducted in the greenhouse with plants being inoculated 24 hours after fungicide treatment. Plants were inoculated with rust spores once. We are now setting up a trial to see fungicide effectiveness when plants are constantly exposed to rust spores within a greenhouse. I will keep you posted.

I hope this information helps, Dr. Jean Williams-Woodard Extension Plant Pathologist for Ornamentals University of Georgia 2106 Miller Plant Sciences Athens, GA 30602

For related rust stories, see Spring and Summer 2001 issues of The Arkla Daylily.

Dr. Williams-Woodard's latest updates from her research also indicate a temperature aspect to rust spore germination in a laboratory. Germination was most active from 50 degrees to 90 degrees. Spore germination may be active at temperatures above and below this range. More work needs to be done but such information through research gives us hope. Support the work!

Some of the Basics

Daconil: spray; 1.25 fluid ounces to 4 gallons water; available "over-thecounter"; surface contact action, 7day intervals

Mancozeb: powder; mix 1.5 Tblsp. to 1 gallon water & apply as a spray; 7-day interval. Long used against rusts

Pro-tech: spray; 2 ounces to 4 gallons water to kill rust spores; 1 ounce to 4 gallons water to help prevent rust spores; limited availability; surface contact action

Banner Maxx: spray; somewhat systemic; 1 ounce to 10 gallons water; limited availability

Fertilome Systemic Fungicide: (same chemical different strength as Banner Maxx) spray; "over-the-counter," label rates

Our 2001 Picks

This year, as in the past, we have made our usual rounds, visiting plantings of daylilies far and near. The National Convention gave us the opportunity to see beautiful gardens where mostly dormants were being well grown. Many of these gardens were settings which were breathtakingly beautiful. Any daylily would have looked lovely indeed in this kind of situation. We did take advantage of the opportunity by focusing much of our attention on interesting landscapes and the beautifully grown plants.

The Regional Meeting in Shreveport, Louisiana as well as the Delta Daylily and Baton Rouge Daylily club tours gave us further opportunity to see what other growers are doing. We could see that the advancement in flower beauty is going ahead full speed, that new daylily forms and patterns are rapidly emerging — something that was not there and only dreamed about only a few years ago.

As a result, we have selected a few cultivars mostly to show the beauty of our favorite flower, and its possibilities as far as colors, forms, patterns, and distinctiveness are concerned.

First on our list and deservedly so was John Kennebrew's **DARLA ANITA**, the daylily that we have found to have the widest, deeply ruffled gold edge of any that we have seen thus far. This 7" beauty is a rosy pink early in the season. Later the colors brighten as the temperatures warm up. Both color variations are very beautiful while the edge remains the same. This beauty is well budded and displays multiple blooms on occasion. Tetraploid, and notable!

FAIREST OF THEM ALL is by Jeff Salter. This is a 6" flower of great beauty, form, substance, and color. Dark pink blooms are wide of petal and recurved. Later in the bloom season and as with DARLA ANITA, FAIREST OF THEM ALL changes to a lighter pink, still beautiful with its bubbly, very ruffled light edges. Tetraploid.

LAVENDER ARROWHEAD is a tetraploid unusual form daylily that was quite different because of its wide-open form, huge cream yellow throat, and extra pleasant lavender color. Hybridized by Pat Stamile, LAVENDER ARROWHEAD grows well, has well spaced buds and has ruffled petals. Blooms are 9" wide. Tetraploid.

Ken Durio's **ROX** is not absolutely new but it really deserves attention. It is a very beautiful, heavily ruffled 6.5" salmon pink blend with a wire gold edge and dark pink eye. In this daylily the proportions of flower size, ruffling, form, and eye color are all contributors to what can be considered as outstanding. It is one of Ken Durio's very best. Tetraploid.

We liked Elizabeth Salter's **HIDDEN RICHES**, a good solid 5.5" medium yellow self of good form and heavy ruffling. Flower form is round and blooms recurved. A dark green throat adds to the beauty of the blooms. Tetraploid, and very popular.

Dan Trimmer's **CUBAN SKIES** is an excellent dark-eyed and dark-edged entry. Blooms are 4.5" wide. The basic color is peach while the darker colors are shades of purple. Blooms are flat, recurved and of good form. Interestingly the dark eye is notched on the petals and sepals. This tetraploid blooms and grows well.

SMALL TEMPEST by Elizabeth Salter is a 3.5" flower of distinction. It is pleasingly colored creamy yellow. A large, round scarlet red band circles the throat. This fine daylily was a garden attention getter for sure because of its good color contrasts. Blooms were wide petaled and well ruffled. The flower throat was a blend of colors – yellow,

pink, and lightest red. This is a top-notch small daylily. Tetraploid.

Dan Trimmer's **RASPBERRY WINTER** was just too full of beautiful colors to ignore. This 4" delicate pale pink had a huge darker pink eye surrounded by a pencil thin darker line. All segments were well ruffled and the blooms sported a dark green throat. RASPBERRY WINTER got the attention it deserved, as it was rather difficult to photograph due to the large crowd admiring its beauty. This small flower should get an "A" for beauty alone. Tetraploid.

DOUBLE SPLASH is by Harold McDonell from Georgia. This 5.5" double bloomed well; its blooms were consistent in form and the flower colors were pale peach pink with a rosy halo. The words "pleasing colors" come to mind when we think of this fine cultivar. Incidentally, the rosy halo color was present on all six segments and petaloids. Diploid

For those of us who seek out the unusual, **WEB OF INTRIGUE** by Pat Stamile will adequately "fill the bill." This 6" pale orange was triangular in form, flat, and nicely ruffled. What really made it interesting was its purple band with etching of a lighter color in the form of oblong spots in the band itself. Added to this was the fact that the blooms had a light-colored arrow-shaped lighter colored spot at each of the three midribs. This daylily is a prime example of the new class of "patterned cultivars." Blooms were indeed very unusual. Tetraploid.

KALEIDOSCOPE TREASURE by Josie Bomar was a big 6" cream pink polychrome with very wide segments that we enjoyed this year at Jack Carpenter's. The flower colors were also tinted a delicate salmon. We really liked the pink ruffled and veined blooms with their hint of a dark pink halo. Diploid.



Our new double is registered as RICHFIELD MURIEL'S DOUBLE (Crochet). This pink-brushed salmon was a favorite in our special bed this year. From KING KAHUNA x FRANCES JOINER, this double has darker pink edges, good ruffling, and four wide, wavy petaloids. The garden presence of RICHFIELD MURIEL'S DOUBLE is a good one indeed. Blooms are 5.5" wide. Diploid.

The daylily year has come and gone and as always there have been some deep concerns regarding daylilies, not the least being rust related. But if we persist and have patience there will come a time when we will be able to use the "right" sprays to control the problem, and rust, like the other problems, will probably become less of a concern than it is at this time.

The proper way to research the rust problem is through the Joe House Scientific Fund. The AHS is already actively funding the necessary work. More money is needed in order to move forward with the project. Individuals and clubs should keep this is mind.

Visiting Over the Garden Fence

Keepin' a club growing!!!

I had a great visit with Kay Day in November and asked her, "How does your home club keep members?" Her answer was to always include horticultural info - especially the basics. Her favorite way is at every meeting to always have a question & answer period near the end for "what's happening in your garden." This would help promote participation, education and brings the group together!

Helpful ideas and excerpts from recent presentation by Dan Trimmer in Alexandria, La.

- --Dan Trimmer: On pollen and hybridizing: Put the "Best on the Best" -His standard: "Color will last."
- On spraying: "For best results, group together cultivars that will need additional spraying."
- -- On marking crosses in the garden: Use colored telephone wire cut into 1-inch sections with each color coded to a separate pollen parent. Loop a piece around scape just below the bloom of the pod parent. No notebook to carry."

Good idea from Reuel Adams,

Louisiana of Adams Display garden. "I'm considering re-doing my beds of daylilies. I will need to spray on a regular basis and will plant the daylilies within two feet of the outside edge of the bed so I can easily and thoroughly reach them with my sprayer." (Some gardeners use a "4-wheeler" vehicle fitted with a big sprayer on it. Saves the gardener's energy for fun things.)

From this "aRoun-Tuit" Gardener:

Di-syston granular is a systemic insecticide that protects plants and daylilies from aphids and sucking insects for up to 4 months. Apply at package rates to the ground around the daylily and water in. Spring and fall applications protect for most of the pest season! Remember that aphids and such love cool spring and fall weather.

Want more plants donated to your club auction? Print some "Donation postcards." Then all year, pass these out (some clubs even stamp & pre-address them) for donors to use to let an auction coordinator know what they will donate. You might even give them blank or preprinted index cards to fill out with cultivar info to return to you for the auctioneer to use. New intros information is often hard to come by. Clubs should keep a copy & good records of who and what was bought so auction-winning bidders are confident they have a central source for information.

Free Compost and Mulch

Check with your city to see about municipal composting. Some cities, Alexandria, La. for one, already collect and process yard waste and limbs into compost and mulch. Save money, energy and help recycling efforts. Landfills would look better as gardens!

If you want to stay Organic in your garden, Cinamite & Neem Oil are good choices and alternatives to chemical pesticides.




