Remembering Viola Parker:

A History in Photos of Her Daylilies and of "Hope and Happiness Gardens," from the 1920s to the 1970s -A Presentation by Doug and Libby Beecher Article by Robert Stassen, Arkansas

Viola Parker was a hybridizer in the 1950s, '60s and early '70s, once served on the AHS Board of Directors for Region 13, and won several Honorable Mention awards plus two Awards of Merit for her introductions.

Writes granddaughter Libby: "I remember her yard being like something out of *Southern Living*, with all sorts of flowers, shrubs and trees. My dad remarked that at one time, Viola estimated she had over 1500 daylilies.

We used to love to go to her house to play in the gardens. I remember she used to get up at 4:30 am during the summer so she could watch her lilies open and make her crosses as soon as the flowers began to open. Dad said she kept a journal that told whether the blooms opened early, stayed open late and whether or not they stood up to the rain, sun and heat.

I enjoyed when she would hold "Open House" in the gardens during the summer. We would all go down and help serve lemonade and cake. After seeing what you all did last summer for the tour, I realize now all the work she put in her garden every year!"

At the same time you're sad knowing the walks in her garden and the time spent visiting with her are over. She would share so much information about her daylilies. Why this one was so much better than the other one and "you really need to have this one!"

Even after she had been gone for over a year Ralph made the remark that he was just sitting and waiting for Pauline to call and tell him what she wanted him to do. In a way this describes how Mother and I feel. You miss those calls.

Pauline and Ralph were good friends with my parents. She was my Sunday school teacher when I was very young. If you could memorize the books of the Bible you would be awarded the most beautiful sucker you can imagine. She had ordered them special. I simply had to win one.

Her garden was beautiful even before she started hybridizing daylilies but when she discovered daylilies a whole new world opened. Mother would help her shell the big green pods into a dishpan. No one could have guessed the road that lay ahead.

Over 300 registered varieties, the Stout Medal, Bertrand Farr Medal for Outstanding Results in the field of Hybridizing, plus a box full of ribbons and awards earned during 40 plus years of dedication.


She never did anything half way. In the summer she would can tomatoes and green beans. In fall and winter she would fill the freezer with casseroles and cobblers to be enjoyed during bloom season. She made so many beautiful gifts for friends. Time was valuable and she never wasted a moment.

She had the gift of self-discipline, the talent of an artist, and the kindness and generosity of a dear friend.

Spring is here and now I realize that in ways she is still here. Just take a walk in your own garden and you'll meet her. The Siloams are growing, the scapes are forming and it won't be too long until we see her pretty face once again.

The winners, Mary Beth Robichaux and Carrie Michelle Jobe both of St. Martinsville, LA, also have become members of Delta Daylily and attend our meetings. Delta Daylily also pays a membership for each winner for one year to the American Hemerocallis Society.

The winning applicant student had to be majoring in Sustainable Agriculture - Plant Science Concentration maintaining a 3.0 Grade Point Average or better and be a Junior or Senior. Delta Daylily has awarded three \$1000.00 scholarships in the past years.

Popularity Poll 2005

Each year members of the American Hemerocallis Society (AHS) have a right to cast a popularity poll ballot for their favorite daylilies in our region. It is the hope of the AHS that this Popularity Poll presents a true picture of which daylilies perform well in our area and which are best liked by the membership. Popularity polls are important to daylily growers—both AHS members and nonmembers—who make daylily selections to offer for sale.

Muriel and I suggest that you start early to consider which ten cultivars for which you will vote. One trick she uses is to purchase a small notebook to carry whenever you visit a garden, and make notes. If the same cultivar catches your eye in most of the gardens you visit, this is one that you probably will want to vote for.

The most important point is to vote. This year, why don't you fool our RVP Elmer Duplantis by casting your ballot by August 1st? This way, when he visits your club, you will be able to tell him that you have already voted.

You don't need an official form to cast your ballot. While there is a ballot in the spring *DaylilyJournal* and in *The ARKLA Daylily*, you can just take a regular sheet of paper. Print "Pop Poll 2005 for AHS Region 13" on the top, list up to ten (maximum) cultivars that you like, put your name and address on the bottom, sign it, and send it to me. If you prefer, you may send it to me by e-mail. Just be sure that it is postmarked no later than September 1st. As tabulator for this region, I'll take it from there and be sure it gets to AHS.


Now for the fun. I'm not using space to give you my address to send your ballot, because it is already somewhere in this newsletter. We'll use the space for other good news. See you in the gardens!

Why Garden Judge?

Muriel Walker

As editor, I occasionally receive a question that seems to have a broad application. The one below was just such a question from recent daylily convert Tom Lilly. My attempt to answer from my point of view follows.

The Garden Judge learns the attributes of a bloom and the overall plant. They participate at their own pace and when they can. When a Garden Judge visits gardens and observes daylilies growing and blooming, they evaluate cultivars so he/she may have an informed opinion. This opinion is voiced when the Awards and Honors ballot comes each year to be voted by the judge. This allows a judge to put in his/her "2 cents worth" on what they feel are worthy and commendable cultivars for the AHS awards. More judges for our region means more voice in what we believe is good in daylily cultivars and it is a way to promote the good introductions from our region's hybridizers. Of course, any choice must be worthy and if it happens to be from Region 13, that's even better.

A judge's term lasts 5 years and there are renewal requirements. These include a log of the gardens you have visited, paying your AHS dues before January 1 each year, vote and return the ballot each year on time and complete Workshop 2 as a refresher within the last three years of your five-year term.)

An Exhibition Judge judges flower shows... this involves more details on the grooming, display and characteristics of a bloom. In itself, exhibition judging rarely involves a garden or growing of the daylilies.

I try not to be prejudiced but I must admit I am not an Exhibition Judge but I am a Garden Judge. Daylily shows bring in new members to a club so shows are a good thing and they need good judges. An exhibition judge may be invited to "judge a show" by a distant club as

Time is NOW to become a Garden Judge... or to renew your Garden Judge status?

If your judge status expires this year, to renew it, you must attend a Garden Judges Workshop 2 before renewing. (One must attend a Workshop 2 as refresher within the last three years of their five-year term.)

Also, you must complete your Five-Year Garden Visitation Log and return it with your renewal application.

You must pay your AHS dues each year before January 1.

You must vote and return the Awards and Honors ballot on time each year.

Mail your renewal forms & log to our Regional Vice president, Elmer Duplantis, before November 15th, 2005.

A hardship extension is possible; contact the Regional Vice President ASAP for details.

If you have a hardship extension for 2005, the above workshop and log requirements must be met before the deadline this year to continue as an AHS Garden Judge.

usually a judge will not "judge" his own home club's show with fellow members entering it. Again there are some requirements for renewing but I don't have that on the top of my head.

Both are worthy pursuits. Both type judges are needed. The old saying was "one is white glove while the other is work glove....."

Anyone can 'audit' Garden Judge Workshops for a fee of \$3.00 per person per session. If you are an AHS member, consider taking it for "credit" toward judgeship. You must take part 1 and the test, which is then sent in to AHS for

grading and if you pass then you can take part 2. So there is a time test grading delay between taking 1 and 2. This may span different years.

When taken for credit, the cost is \$5 per person per session. One must have been an AHS member for 3 years and completed both sessions in their chosen area, passing the tests required, before you may apply for judgeship from AHS.

I think this is all on the AHS website. Take a look and enjoy!

Light in the Rust Tunnel?

Pat Soileau, central Louisiana, sends this: On a personal observation - when rust hit, we were all really upset. At least our daylily rust does not stop the blooms. My brother is a soybean farmer and the new rust for soybeans

(expected to really hit hard this year after being brought in by a hurricane from South America) will reduce production by at least 80% if not sprayed.

There are several test sites all over the state which were planted last month. It is hoped that the rust will strike these

and that they can use different sprays to determine which will be the most effective.

Editor's note: Perhaps this will provide an economic motivation for study to find a rust treatment that may benefit soybean farmers and our daylilies. Let's hope so!

Looking Back, Looking Forward!

Last December marks one year since I started making some changes in my life. The big change was doing something with all this weight I had gained over the last 15 years. One year later, I have never felt better! I could wear the gray Italian suit I wore some 15 years ago.

Change is inevitable and its impact can be positive or negative. The daylily has been profoundly affected by change. Emerging from species it has been transformed from yellow and orange spidery flowers to round and flat, wide petaled, multi-budded, double-bubbled edged beauties with doubled chromosomes. What other possible flower transformations this once humble flower can undergo is left only to the imagination of those in the future.

For me to have watched this transformation into gorgeous new shapes, forms and embellishments of the daylily bloom has been a wonderful trip. It has brought a lot of pleasure and enjoyment to many wonderful people both past and present. However, all the changes for the positive have brought about some negatives! Somewhere along the way we let the stamina that made the daylily the "perennial supreme" slip away. The late Dr. Philip G. Corliss titled his 1951 book, Hemerocallis, the Perennial Supreme, expressing what he and others in the early years enjoyed about their favorite perennial.

I grew up with daylilies in the mid-1950s and at an early age, I can remember never having to spray daylilies for pest problems. Two serious pests have risen that require some pest management care and they are the daylily crownaphid and daylily rust! Thrips and spider mites can be problems but I have learned to managed them by not over fertilizing with high nitrogen fertilizer; a precursor of rapid multiplication. Of course, there is daylily rot!

For the future, I seek daylilies that have the flower form, shape, color or embellishment that I want for my garden. I also want plants that establish easy, have vigor and stamina, disease and pest resistance or strong tolerance. I do not want to spray daylilies on a 10 to 14-day pest management schedule. As a daylily consumer, you and I can demand this in daylily cultivars. If breeders want their business to be part of the future and want you to buy their daylilies then they will have to be even more selective in future introductions. The latest pretty face will not be enough for tomorrow's introduction! The overall health, vitality, as well as the floral characteristics, will be part of the consideration to be the future award winners.

One might say, "I am just going to grow the older daylilies." By observing the daylilies in the garden, one will find that both old and new cultivars get rust; while some of the older as well as new daylilies do not or get very little. It is the ones that do not, regardless of age, that will contribute the DNA for resistance to the future generations of "care free" daylilies. The imagination of the next generation of daylily breeders will not be limited to the present mind set, but working and hybridizing under new paradigms. I know this will happen; otherwise, the daylily would wane in popularity especially in the Gulf States of Zone 8 and 9, and will only retain any interest in the North where rust is not a problem. There are too many daylily folks that will not let that happen and will rise to the challenge making it all joy and fun while it happens!

As a horticulturist, I enjoy all kinds of plants, but the daylily is my first love and still maintains that first place from my boyhood. My future goals will be to this end, to keep secure the daylily's place as "the perennial supreme." Through observation and evaluation I will be eliminating daylilies that do not make the cut. In my garden, the daylily selection will be slim and trim just like its caretaker! Purchasing of new daylilies will be done with careful considerations; not just pretty but resistance and tolerance to disease and pests. To effect this kind of change, do it through the market place. Market = sells = dollars.

Here is to a new era in daylilies where the best is yet to come!

Bob Scott on Hybridizing

The Northwest Arkansas Daylily Society kicked off the 2005 season with a presentation by hybridizer Bob Scott of Yukon, Oklahoma on February 8. Bob's color slides are well done, his approaches to hybridizing in daylilies are innovative, and combined with his personality provide for an entertaining, informative presentation.

First, Scott is committed to developing dormant daylilies as an effort to eliminate daylily foliage as a host for rust spores in areas which only have moderate frost conditions, or just sufficient to kill the foliage, if not sufficient in duration to destroy the rust spores.

An intriguing selection technique he applies is sorting the seedlings based on their dormancy. Seeds are sown and transplanted into pots, and moved into a poly greenhouse to maximize late When night season growth. temperatures drop into the 20s, as in the late October and November, the greenhouses are opened up, allowing the Oklahoma wind to work its effect on identifying the dormant seedlings, a dramatic effect in a color slide presentation. Following this, the seedlings are sorted with respect to dormancy, with dormant plants lined out separately from evergreen seedlings. Scott's slides also show the dormants to have superior early spring growth in his beds, although evergreen types make up this difference by the late season.

A selection approach based on dormancy separates siblings into different areas of the bed, rather than rowing them out adjacently, which eliminates tracking based on parentage, but this is irrelevant to Scott. An analogy he presented was that if he were given the choice of assembling a basketball team based on the players' parents, or could choose a team based on the players' performance on the court, he would choose to base his selection on

basketball performance every time. Similarly, he feels that knowing the parentage of a seedling interferes with making a fair evaluation of the plant on its merits. A hybridizer would be more reluctant to discard a seedling when its parents are highly regarded cultivars.



Central Arkansas Spring

Jim and Kathy Elliott Conway, Arkansas

This year we have about 4 acres of daylilies to transplant, plus get a house started. We have had the wettest winter ever and still getting lots of rain. The least it could do is stay through the summer.

In a slide show of seedlings for the e-mail robin members to vote on, one of our slides took 6th place and we felt that was pretty good.

This spring our breeding will be for blue eyes and edges in the tetraploids. The diploids will continue to be big lovely doughnuts.

Gin Waste: Kathy and I have been working with a new potting mix for our potted daylilles. We found a new compost mix made from cottonseed hulls and waste material. It is called Gin Waste. We borrowed a professional pH tester and tested as we went. The pH is 8.1.

Before we started, we put 3 single fans in the Gin Waste with no fertilizer or lime and the plants loved it. Then we began adding composted pine bark put through small screenings. This bark we tested registered a pH of 5.9. By using 4 parts pine bark and one part Gin Waste, we came up with a perfect 6.7 pH. To this mix, we added a handful of Nutricote Fertilizer (nine-month formula) to each 3-gallon pot in which we have a single fan daylily.

The plants seemed to like this very well; no yellowing or drooping of foliage. and didn't seem to have any transplant shock. They were dark green and looked very good after two weeks.



Gin Waste: after 5 weeks

Plants have been in pots of Gin Waste/compost mix for about 5 weeks now.

The picture of the 3 plants are in straight Gin Waste, no lime or fertilizer. I dug them when they were about 3 inch and they are dormants. As you can see in the picture they like it. Now you know what we know. Jim

P.S. to Jim's tip: I have observed in many gardens and in my own, that a one-gallon pot is not big enough for most daylilies except to stay alive. The 3-gallon size Jim mentions actually allows them to thrive, bloom, keeps roots cool plus the room to grow. Muriel Walker


What's bugging us?

Things that bug us about daylilies? Most are bugs! This is an up close and personal look at the four biggest culprits in our daylily gardens.

The Daylily Aphid

This is a tiny soft-bodied insect that feeds on the new leaves in the center of the plant. Often they are hard to spot until the population is significant. The color will vary by age with young being a paler shade than the adult shown in the lower drawing.


By tiny, it could be compared to the size of the



exclamation point following this sentence!

They use a feeding tube/tongue to penetrate the leaf surface and suck the juices from the plant. If untreated, the

plant loses vigor and with a heavy infestation, the plant can be killed.




Aphids are active in cool weather, often before the gardener is checking for pests. Fall and early spring are often most active times.

Spray with Malathion can control aphids. Be sure to spray under the leaves if at all possible and apply only to "run off." Over application wastes chemicals and money. Most sprays need approximately 4 hours to dry on the leaf surfaces.

Slugs

Slugs attack the leaves and blooms of daylilies. They feed at night in the cool and hide from the sun. Pinebark chips and wood are favorite hiding materials. They can be eradicated by using slug bait.




Red Spider Mites

Spider mites, often red, are tiny creatures that attack daylilies under their leaves, also sucking juices from the plants. These mites resemble very tiny spiders.

They also make spider-like webs under the leaves.

One way to determine if daylilies are be in gattacked by spider mites is to hold a



white sheet of paper under the suspected leaf, tapping the leaf with the thumb. If mites are present, they will fall on to the paper and move around. A good quality magnifying glass is also a very good way to identify mites.

Mites can be best controlled with mitacides such as "Avid." There are other mitacides. But the product "Kelthane" should NOT be used on daylily plants as it will seriously damage them.

Thrips

Mature thrips are tiny winged insects. Unsually they are pale in color from brown to gold to ivory. They are most active in cool weather and will suck the juices from the immature scapes and destroy all the



buds while they are near the ground and under the mulch, resulting in deformed buds and blooms. It is best to begin to spray for thrips during the cool early spring

months to keep them under control. They should be controlled with the use a spray labeld for thrips. Follow all label directions carefully.



It's all in "The Name"

Cygon 2E will be missing from our store shelves very soon. That name will be important to this story - so bear with me. I learn something every day and here is one I want to pass along to all of you. It seems in the chemical industry, a manufacturer must register a label for a product with each state it which it sells that product and pay each state a very hefty fee. That registration lasts for several years, perhaps 5. When that registration must be renewed, again in each state, the company must decide and if they renew, the renewal fee is amazingly high; again to each state. Do the math.



Got Fire Ants?

Fire Ant Bait

5 pounds corn meal 1 cup sugar 4 tablespoons Orthene Mix well, protect from moisture in a dry container and use as usual.



Spring 2005

One of the staple products for bugs in daylilies, Cygon 2-E is just such a case. It was a systemic Ornamental and Vegetable insecticide for control of scale, mites and aphids. Unfortunately, it seems the Hi-Yield brand, which is the brand often seen in much of Region 13, has decided not to renew "the label." So we won't see that name on the label. Other chemical companys have products on the shelves for sale, products that contain the same chemical as Cygon 2-E.

Here is the fun part. Cygon 2-E had a 23.4% active ingredient of Dimethoate. "The name." One product, Ferti-lome Ornamental and Evergreen Spray, is available as a replacement, has the same chemical but only 8% active ingredient. That's 3 times less. The label

lists daylilies as one of the plants on which this product may be used and spray applied. There may be other products out there so we must search the sources.

Please note: The ferti-lome Ornamental and Evergreen Spray product is NOT labeled for use on vegetables!

As gardeners, we will need to study more to learn the chemical names and percentage. Then find a product to give the desired results. Being a better student may be as easy as asking questions of a truly knowledgeable person, then keeping a notebook, journal or easy reference in our pocket. These may save us frustration at the garden center. And give us more time to enjoy our gardens.

Although Dorlene is a relatively new member of the White County Daylily Society, she has acquired a large number of beautiful daylilies and she loves to share their beauty with others.


Blue Bird Hill Farm






