## Floral Design Tips

David Waters  
Hemerocallis Study Club  
Shreveport, Louisiana

I submit these "tips" to those who may be interested in entering in AHS flower shows. These "tips" come from personal observation and are not intended as any sort of "design authority" statement. My experience has been in commercial flower arrangement, which is very different from the garden club and flower show design work. These are things I have observed from previous shows.

Your container is the first element to select. Containers determine much of the form, style, and size of your finished arrangement. Unusual containers are great choices that attract instant attention.

At the top of my "tips" list would be SIMPLICITY. Keep it simple and focused: thereby avoiding that unwanted "busy" or "cluttered" appearance.

Next on my list is VISUAL BALANCE. Strive for Visual Balance instead of Physical Balance. For example use a group of smaller blossoms on one side to balance a larger one on the other side instead of a large flower on each side.

Special attention should be given to HEIGHT. Taller designs generally attract more attention. Go as tall as possible and still maintain the proportion element.

COLOR COMBINATIONS; especially unusual ones are great attention getters. Don't be afraid of combining colors. I always remember a statement made to me by M. "Buddy" Benz many years ago: "There is no such thing as a bad color combination so long as it pleases the artist doing it."

Don't Fret, Relax, Jump In, Have Fun — You May be Surprised!

David Waters is the winner of the 2002 AHS Tri-Color Award, a special award in the Artistic Division, given annually to an AHS member whose arrangement is judged best of the tricolor rosette winners of AHS accredited shows. Selection, by a panel of National Council of State Garden Club judges, is made on the basis of photographs.

## Helen Calhoun Awarded Region 13 2004 Regional Service Award

Helen Calhoun is from Mansfield, Louisiana. She was the recipient of the AHS sponsored Regional Service Award for 2004, which was awarded at the AHS Convention in Saint Louis this past summer. Her contributions to the region are many and are ongoing. She has served as secretary of the Shreveport Study Club for many years. In 1993 – 1994 she served as Regional Vice President and Newsletter editor.

Helen has served on numerous regional committees which include the Nominating Committee for the selection of Regional Officers. She served as a member of the Planning Committee for the AHS National Convention held in the Shreveport area in 1992.

Helen and her husband, James, prepared an exceptionally beautiful daylily garden for the National in 1992. They also maintained an AHS Display Garden

for many years. It has been a showcase for displaying new and worthy daylilies, including the Calhoun noteworthy introductions of large flowers and super spiders.

This garden has also hosted the Emma Middlebrooks Bed which showcased the work of Region 13 hybridizers at the 1997 Regional Meeting.

A very talented Helen Calhoun has had her art work grace many Regional Newsletters and other publications. One of her notable contributions was the designing of the logo for the AHS National Convention which was held in Lafayette in 1998.

She has also contributed plants for local, regional, and national meetings for many years. Supplying plants for the project, Helen has also donated numerous plants to the City of Mansfield, since it has adopted the daylily as its city flower.

Helen has served as an AHS Exhibition Judge and has assisted in flower show preparations.

Helen Calhoun continues to work for better local, Regional, and National daylily organizations. She was indeed a worthy recipient of the Regional Service Award and we salute the good work that she has done to promote our favorite flower.

## Kalen Begnaud Co-Winner of 2004 Christine Erin Stamile Youth Award



If you grow up in a family tradition of growing fine plants, what is a big step for a young man? Being awarded the Christine

Erin Stamile Youth Award by AHS fits that scenario.

Kalen Begnaud was awarded this very honor at the recent National Convention in St. Louis.

Kalen follows his father and his great-grandfather who have been active in the gardening world. Kalen's great-grandfather was a noted rosarian in the 1950s. His father, Ken, has worked with daylilies for some years at their home just north of Lafayette, Louisiana, and had served as Region 13 RVP.

All in our region and in the AHS join in congratulating Kalen for winning this award and recognition.

Following is a reprint of article by Betty Roberts, AHS Youth News, Vol. 6, No 2 Fall/Winter 2004.

Kalen hails from Lafayette, Louisiana. His daylily interests started several years ago when he attended many local daylily club meetings with his parents, Ken and Melissa Begnaud. As his dad's interest in AHS grew, (Ken served as RVP), so did Kalen's.

While helping his dad and mom in the garden, Kalen decided to start his own hybridizing program. He says it is fun to go out and collect pollen and make crosses, but the most fun is seeing your own seedlings bloom for the first time. His first registered cultivar, CLOUD BEFORE THE STORM, is a diploid, but Kalen works with both diploids and tetraploids. He learned conversion techniques from his dad and now has several conversions of his own seedlings and other cultivars which he is anxious to use.

Kalen says, "My personal joys of daylilies come from hybridizing and

colchine converting, knowing that I accomplished and created them with my own hands."

Kalen is a seasoned exhibitor and is both an AHS exhibition student judge and a garden judge. He is now attending the University of Louisiana at Lafayette and plans to major in landscape and horticulture management so he can continue to enjoy the daylily and other flowers for years to come.

To win the Christine Erin Stamile Youth award, a youth must apply, have been a member of AHS for the 2 years prior to receiving the award, maintain a daylily collection, write an essay with photographs on how their collection began and their enjoyment of daylilies. The award winner is voted by the AHS Youth committee from the applications received.

## In Memoriam

### Mrs. Betty Barnes 1905-2004

Victoria Elizabeth "Betty" Barnes was from Camden, Arkansas, where she attended several universities and married Major Robert Barnes, an aviator during the Second World War. This prompted her to become an aviatrix and she was one of the very first female pilots in the country. Her husband died in action during the war, and he was awarded the Purple Heart posthumously.

Betty had been interested in gardening for decades and during that time she co-authored handbooks for the National Council of Garden Clubs, the National Daffodil Society, and the American Daylily Society.

She was instrumental, along with Luke Senior, in transferring Arkansas from Region 11 to Region 13. This was done because the Arkansas climate for the most part was similar to that of Louisiana. The addition of Arkansas into Region 13 was approved by vote with a majority of the AHS membership of both states approving the move. Betty served on the AHS Board of Directors and was elected to serve as president of the American Hemerocallis Society in 1974-1975.

In 1976 she moved to Natchez, Mississippi to be near her son and his family. Here she continued her interests in gardening.

Betty continued to grow daylilies in Natchez. They were all grown in containers and she tended her own plants throughout her life. She also continued to judge daylily shows and travel to Regional and National Meetings.

We will remember her as a person who always had a smile, a person who always gave of herself willingly, and with a generous heart as a true Christian.

Betty died at 99 years old, just missing a century of wonderful life. She was a true friend.

"The first meeting was held on September 3, 1994, at the home of Theo and Tot Ratliff. Present at this first meeting were Lyn Odom, Doris Barron, Billy and Nancy Deville, and Patricia Deegan. A decision was made to name the club the Cenla Daylily Society. Also, the meeting time was set for the first Saturday of each month. Tot Ratliff was asked to serve as president and Doris Barron to serve as secretary until officers could be officially elected. Other meetings were held over the next few months. People other than those mentioned above who attended meetings were Joy Lafleur, Bonita Fontenot, Ellis and Wrenetta Powell, Lavelle and Alma Doughty, and Charlene Soileau."<sup>1</sup>

Today, CENLA hosts an annual Fall Symposium that regularly draws 200 daylily enthusiasts from Louisiana and surrounding states for a full day of informational sessions with national hybridizers, social reception and lunch plus a live plant auction worthy of a national event.

In alternating years, CENLA hosts one of the few Daylily Exhibition Shows in southern Louisiana. It is well attended and introduces the daylily to many new converts at each show. The flower arrangement by member Nancy Melder in the 2002 show won the AHS award for photo of an arrangement and was featured in *The Daylily Journal*.

The club can claim 2 members who have national AHS Display Gardens, The Gardens of Ellis Powell in Alexandria, Louisiana, and Oleo Acres, the gardens of Jay and Judy Farquhar in DeRidder, Louisiana.

# Cream of the Crop in 2004

This year was a productive one as far as making pictures of beautiful daylilies was concerned. We traveled far and wide to take slides of what we thought were the best that we saw in each garden. Paring the selections down to just a few was quite a job, however, since there were so many cultivars out there to consider. It proves that many people in many different places are hybridizing beautiful, outstanding daylilies. This year was also a productive one at home and we marveled at what new was blooming. It has become evident that each year brings new hybridizing ideas concerning our favorite flower. It proves that the daylily is on the march forward to some as yet unknown or realized time. This will keep the excitement alive and well. As usual our selections are in no particular order.

1. **RED EYE GRAVY** by Eddie Scott was the outstanding gem in his garden during the Florida Regional Meeting. This tetraploid was a five-inch cream with a bold scarlet red eye and edge. Blooms were standouts, especially since there were numbers of them showing off in this huge garden. We also liked the dark green throat on **RED EYE GRAVY**.

2. Jeff Salter's **FOGGY LONDON TIME** made an impression on us because of its clear lavender flower color and creamy edge. The 6½-inch blooms were triangular in form, slightly recurved, and with very pronounced, heavy ruffling. A dark green throat accented all of this. Blooms also had a very light green watermark throat pattern. This tetraploid was fine indeed.

3. **EMMA JEAN** by Jerry McCarty proves that there are improvements to be made in all daylily colors. This diploid was a good, 6½-inch true pink with wide segments on a flat open formed, slightly recurved flower. All segments also sported thin, light white edges with good ruffling and a dark green throat. This daylily had much class indeed, and had a notable garden presence.

4. Mort Morss' tetraploid **SAN LUIS HALLOWEEN** was one of those wildly colored deep orange daylilies with a purple eye and edge that we liked. Round, 5-inch plus blooms were standouts for their unusual color contrasts and nice ruffling. Another interesting feature of **SAN LUIS HALLOWEEN** was its thick heavy substance and apparently good color fastness, since the picture was taken in the hot noonday sun.

5. **IDA BELLE DEBOERS**, by Ottis Houston, was causing lots of "ohs and ahs" in his Florida garden. This 5¼-inch pink had a darker pink eye and edge, giving it a nicely framed appearance. The blooms on this tetraploid had very wide segments, which gave them a full overlapped form. Heavily ruffled edges were also very wide and prominent. This beauty sported a deep green heart and a light yellow throat.

6. **AMERICAN FREEDOM** is a Larry Grace-Frank Smith introduction of note. This thick substantiated tetraploid was 5½ inches and absolutely round in form. Bloom colors varied slightly on different days, but the pink and peach colors were dominant, as was the fine ruffled gold edge of this beauty. **AMERICAN FREEDOM** was well budded and had easy rebloom, giving it a long bloom period.

7. Bob Carr's **BETTER THAN BUTTER** was just that—a butter-colored 5¼-inch yellow bloom, which was even better than butter because it also had a fine ruffled gold edge. Not your round form here, but a great informal look made **BETTER THAN BUTTER** very interesting on bloom days. We liked the huge ruffles, green throat, and heavy substance of this fine tetraploid.

8. In our next pick, **PINK EMBROIDERY** by Pat Stamile, those of us who have seen or grown Pat's **AIN'T SHE NICE** will easily recognize the color similarity. It was a delicate and beautiful 6-inch double pink with wide segments and a huge puff of large

petaloids in the center of each bloom. This tetraploid is a fine addition to the hybridizer's output of exceptional daylilies. PINK EMBROIDERY makes a lasting impression because of its beautiful form and delicate pink color.

9. Ned Roberts has been hybridizing spider and unusual form daylilies for the last few years. Many of his best ones were being grown in the Becky Adams' garden for National in 2003 in Charlotte, North Carolina. They were unusual and very interesting because of their different forms and colors. We spotted Ned's ORCHID MOONRISE at the Dan Hansen garden in Florida and decided that it was truly different and very unusual indeed. The 7-inch purple blooms had the grey, narrow "chevron" eye as many spider type daylilies have. Blooms were heavily veined and of a darker purple color while the petals were recurved and twisted under. Sepals rolled under and were pointed at their ends, making the blooms look somewhat like orchids. Added to all this was the chartreuse throat and long pistil, making the impression that this daylily looked much like an orchid. It was distinctive, different, and deserving — a fine diploid spider.

10. IN SEARCH OF ANGELS by Pat Stamile was a compact 5½-inch cerise-rose tetraploid that made its presence known for good reasons. The bloom colors were outstanding as was the round form and wide segments. It was deeply ruffled with a yellow band and chartreuse throat. A faint yellow midrib and darker rose veining set off the blooms superbly.

11. Dan Hansen's CAN YOU SEE ME NOW must have a story behind that unusual name, but we don't know what it is. Perfectly round five-inch blooms were pale amber with a bright cranberry eye and edge. We liked the color contrasts, the "rolled back" form of this daylily as well as its nice ruffling and picotee edging around the petals. Notable also were the bright cranberry colored sepals on this fine tetraploid.

Blooms measured five-inches plus the added attractions of a pale chartreuse edge on the petals and raised midribs. Very pretty!

12. John Kinnebrew has hybridized many good daylilies and ALEXA KATHRYN is no exception. In fact, it was the first thing that we saw as we entered his garden. This outstanding tetraploid was the supreme attention getter that day. Huge blooms were 6-¾ inches wide, of fine lavender color and with large, bubbly gold ruffles tinged chartreuse around the petal edges. Also, the lavender color was darker around the petal edges. The contrast was noticeable and prominent in all the blooms. This was a daylily of great distinction.

We had taken our Florida trip none too soon this summer, as it would be only a short time later that four hurricanes devastated parts of the state. Some of these affected our daylily-growing friends there. We hope that they have overcome this kind of unfriendly weather. The year was successful for us otherwise and as usual we enjoyed taking pictures of the many daylilies that we saw on our travels.



## Snippet from the Crochets

"Remember to spray plants only to the point of 'run off' or 'drip.' More is not better! Applying chemicals beyond that point has been observed to be harmful to the foliage."

## A Gardener's Notebook

**Want to get rid of ants in your flowers beds?** "Another advantage for flower growers is that plenty of compost has been found to keep the moisture level of the flower bed too high for ants. Compost can hold 300% to 500% of its weight in moisture as compared to mineral soil."

### Autumn Leaves

"Because trees have extensive root systems, they draw nutrients up from deep within the subsoil. Much of this mineral bounty is passed on to the leaves, making them a superior garden resource. Pound for pound, the leaves of most trees contain twice the mineral content of manure. The considerable fiber content of leaves aids in improving the aeration and crumb structure of most soils."

### Alfalfa - Super Additive

While the merits of alfalfa placed in your flower bed have been covered before, here is one more use - in the compost pile. "In combination with leaves, alfalfa serves as a good compost stimulant and activator; its 12:1 carbon/nitrogen (C/N) ratio helps bring the compost pile's overall C/N ratio into the desired 25:1 to 30:1 range. While expensive when sold as hay, alfalfa is moderately priced in the form of dehydrated pellets or meal, and may be purchased at most feed stores."
